ART IN THE REDWOODS

Brisk Sales at Art in the Redwoods PPQG Booth

Thanks to the generous donations of quilted items by our members, more than \$2,500 in sales were made over the 3-day Art in the

Redwoods Festival at the Gualala Arts Center last month.

As in the past, the top selling item was quilts – a total of 18 were sold, including two bed-sized ones, and 16 others ranging from crib to lap quilt size. Other top sellers included 14 microwave bowl holders, 10 stuffed animals (courtesy of Sylvia Keller), 6 Humpty-Dumpty toys, 8 pincushions, 8 potholders, and 8 table runners, two of which had matching hot pads/potholders.



In addition, our Guild's "Labyrinth" raffle quilt was a big hit. Many thanks to Barbara Dunsmoor, Sylvia Edwards, Carole Garcia, Dee Goodrich, Kalynn Oleson, and Cheryl Faconti who created that amazing quilt with machine quilting by Sharon Malikowski. While the final total raised for art scholarships and Art Camp depends on the number of pre-sold tickets at the Arts Center, our booth alone sold \$780 worth of tickets during the festival.

More than 20 guild volunteers took turns setting up, staffing the booth, and returning unsold items to the storage bins upstairs. The money raised will support our programs and guest teachers for the coming year. Many thanks to all who made the event successful!

FESTIVAL OF TREES

November 24 and 25

It may still be August, but I could swear that Christmas is in the air! I know I heard silver bells on the beach the other day. I may have even seen a snowflake or two! This is reminding me that we need to be creating the ornaments for our tree for Festival of Trees. Some of our Piecemaker elves have begun creating the ornaments that will again make our tree the best and most beautiful. One of our most talented elves, Katherine Gyorfí has created a most wonderful tree topper (pictured below).

As usual, Katherine has created something very special. One of our past president elves, Judy Riddle, has agreed to create a tree skirt. Knowing Judy and the quality of her work, it will be a beautiful enhancement to our tree.



BUT WE NEED MANY MORE ORNAMENTS.

There are a few requirements: 1) The ornaments should be no bigger than three inches (the tree will be relatively small and narrow); 2) The colors we have chosen are blue, silver and white, with a bit of glitter or glam, if possible; 3) Garland won't fit on these trees (instead, we are using battery operated string lights that look like small crystal balls); and 4) we need them as soon as you can make them.

I will be away for the month of October, so I hope to have everything in hand before I go. I know FOT isn't until Thanksgiving weekend, but we don't want to leave it till the last minute. Make as many ornaments as you like. We will put as many on the tree as it can handle and still look beautiful. If there are more than we can use, we will sell them at our booth or return them to you. Let us know which you prefer when you turn in your ornaments.

You can get them to me at the September guild meeting, leave them at the Dolphin or drop them at my home. Call me, if the latter is what you wish to do (785-2877), so I'll be sure to be home. I've asked Cheryl Faconti to collect any you may bring to the October guild meeting.

I have great faith in you. We have been challenged to repeat our double win last year. Let's do it!

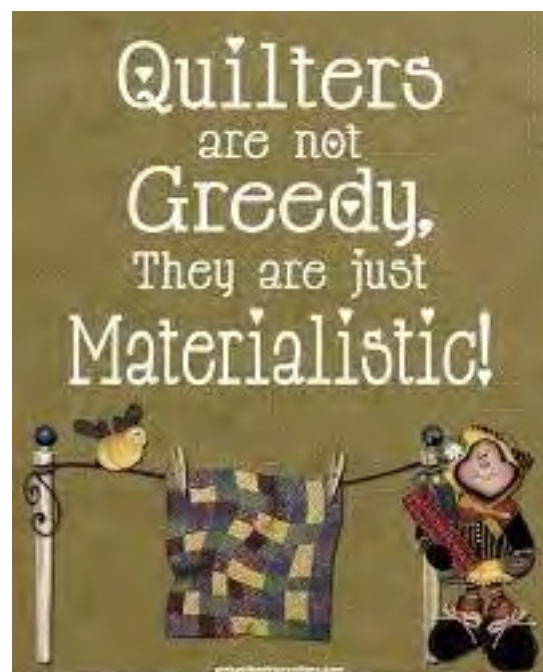

You would need to pay \$50.00 now to hold your space at the retreat, and then pay the remaining \$120.00 any time prior to **February 5, 2018.**

We will again be meeting at the Dry Creek Inn Best Western in Healdsburg. After you have given your check to Pam, call the Inn directly to reserve your room. The prices have gone up a little this year. For a standard room with two queen beds, the rate is \$89.00 per night (still a great rate, especially if you are sharing a room).
