How many countries do you know who have a "Goddess of Weaving?" If you attended our January guild meeting with Leslie Rego, you know at least one that does. Perhaps that's the key to Guatemala's long heritage of excellence in the realm of textiles. Leslie shared with us her intimate knowledge of Guatemala and the exuberance of its vibrant culture. Her program was as finely crafted as the antique textiles which comprised her trunk show. Leslie's work is inspired by the patterns and colors that are everywhere in her adopted country.

With slides and narration, Leslie provided us with a rare glimpse into our unique southern neighbor, its captivating customs, festivals, rituals, architecture and people, and how they have informed her outlook on life. Ms. Rego's stunning quilts reflect her continuing "love affair with Guatemala" and the imprint of its peoples' way of celebrating life.

Perhaps the most dramatic of her captured memories was Antigua's Holy Week custom of decorating the streets with "carpets" of dyed sawdust, and flowers — thousands of flowers. The resulting tapestries are intricate and beautiful beyond all reason, and equally short lived. Soon after completion they are trampled by joyful processions through the streets, then swept up and away. No one doubts that they were worth the effort.

Leslie's quilt series, "Processional Carpets," replicates some of the design concepts from this long tradition. For Leslie Rego, quilting gives new life to old and new treasured memories. Her fascination with Guatemala is indeed contagious.

Libby Lehman's workshop, Creativity for Klutzes, February 14 and 15, is a must for aspiring quilters. After some simple and fun exercises, students will create a small quilt top using a variety of techniques. A few spaces were available at press time, so call Gualala Arts today to enroll — 884-1138. The fee is \$130 if you're a member in BOTH the guild and Gualala Arts and \$150 if a member in EITHER the guild or Gualala Arts.



BEGINNING QUILTING CLASS Six Thursdays starting February 22 9:30—12:20

This class is for beginner quilters with no previous experience. The class size will be small so that each may receive lots of individual attention. Basic quilting skills will be taught. Students will make ten different quilt blocks while learning cutting and piecing. A suuply list will be given on enrollment. It is the instructors' goal to present alternate ways of cutting and piecing so that the student can select the one with which they are most comfortable. Color selection and use is emphasized.

The students will have enough blocks for a quilt top at the end of the course. Mary Austin and Janet Sears are experienced quilters who love quilting and teaching. Cost for the six sessions is \$80 — a real bargain! Call Gualala Arts to enroll and get started on your own personal addiction!

#### GOALS FOR THE NEW YEAR?

As a quilter, do you have creative goals? Many friends tell me, "It's just for fun. I don't want to 'stress' about quilting." But in conversation, they admit that their creative longings are important to them and fret about the fact that somehow "there never seems to be enough time for what "I REALLY WANT TO DO!" Here are a few ideas to think about if you choose to make some New Year goals that relate to your quilting..

- ·Vow to spend at least 15 minutes a day in your sewing area, even if you just fondle your fabrics.
- · Spend a small amount of time quilting 3 times a week.
- ·Select one unfinished project to complete.
- · Make a Comfort Quilt that allows you to explore a new technique.
- ·Take a quilt class.
- ·Try a new project, like "Bag O' Stuff."
- · Buy at least one fabric you love even if it does not go with anything else.
- ·Try making casual blocks with colors you rarely work ith.
- •Trade fabrics with a friend for new inspiration.
- · Start a "Quilt Ideas" sketch book and collect photos of appealing quilt ideas.

After you have dreamed and gotten some ideas, WRITE DOWN YOUR GOALS! Use a pencil — you can change or delete them at any time. Then post the goals where you will see them often. This will make your goal(s) real.

Don't make this complicated; keep it simple; enjoy the process. Embrace your creativity, and have a happy, creative new year.

#### BAG O' STUFF!!!

This exciting new project is an exercise in creativity that is fun and challenging for all people at all levels. We each fill a clear one-gallon Ziploc bag with "stuff" that is currently in our studios. We will exchange bags and create something with the items in the bag. The filled bags are due at the Guild meeting in March; six months later a finished product is due.

The Bag O' Stuff can include fabrics, threads, yarns, buttons, embellishments, paper, wire, mesh, plastic, partially finished blocks or projects. All must fit into the Ziploc bag and must come from your studio, not another room in your home. You'll have two months to think about what goes in the bag.

At the March meeting I will collect bags and re-distribute them. You have until September to make something out of the stuff in the bag — a wall hanging, a table runner, a shoe box, a piece of jewelry, a book cover. You can sew, glue gun, staple or put it together in any fashion you can think of. There are no restrictions!

What you put in is very important. If you want something beautiful and intriguing to be returned to you then put in beautiful, interesting items. Remember that in making art, repetition is important. If you have a bunch of leftover triangles include all of them rather than just one. That helps to give a focal point to the finished project.

You will not have to use all or everything in the bag, just a fair sampling -51%. The other 49% can be what you add to the project.

So: fill a one gallon clear Ziploc bag with stuff from your studio. Do not put your name on the bag; do put your name on a piece of paper and slip it inside so that it can be seen without opening the bag.
