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### GUILD GLIMMERS

Quilters have to get extremely close to Sally Collins' quilts to see the details. Or even, sometimes, to see the quilt squares themselves! Sally Collins is widely known for her miniature quilts, although she makes quilts of all sizes. On May 18th the Guild was privileged to have Sally speak on the topic of quality workmanship. She possesses this skill to an extreme degree, because in her small quilts any tiny error is magnified. Many discovered this fact in her Wednesday and Thursday class on precision piecing.

To Sally Collins, quality workmanship means performing each part of the quilt-making process one step at a time. This calls for focus — focusing on the project at hand — and determination — keeping at it until you get it right.

Sally broke "quality workmanship" into four areas. The first is high intention. We must be very motivated to do what we set out to do, or we simply will not do a good job. The second item is that we need sincere effort in our work. We must be willing to spend the time necessary to do the job right. Our attitude plays a big part here!

Third is intelligent direction. Take classes, gain knowledge. And — surprise — we are actually supposed to read the quilting books we buy!

Fourth is skillful execution, which we know takes practice, and correcting our mistakes as we go. Sally says, "Sew, critique, correct, sew, critique, correct, etc." She told us that good sewing is more about getting out of trouble than sewing perfectly. The secret is to correct as we go, rather than at the end.

At the conclusion of her talk, Sally answered questions, then graciously permitted us to closely examine and touch her miniature masterpieces.

## WHAT DO I DO ...?

Janet Sears and Mary Austin will teach "What Do I Do Now That I Have All These Blocks?" Thursdays at 9:30 a.m. in the Conference Room at Gualala Arts.

June 7: Arranging your blocks: straight, on point, sashing, borders, determining the finished size of your quilt.

June 14: How to "sandwich:" kinds of batting, backing (whole or pieced), layering (pinning or basting).

June 21: Preparing to quilt: hand or machine quilting, choosing a design, marking the quilt for quilting.

June 28: Squaring the Quilt: blocking, binding, mitered corners, sleeves and labels.

No need to bring sewing machines, just your questions! Cost for the class is \$40 for members of both PPQG and GA, or \$60 if you're a member of either PPQG or GA. You can audit one class for \$10.
