Mary Austin to Speak on Japanese Textiles

Everyone should have a passion, and Mary Austin certainly has one (at least). Ever since her first trip to Japan, she has been hooked on Japanese

antique country indigo
textiles (aizome). In her
presentation on May 15,
she will describe and share
textiles both familiar and
arcane (shibori, kasuri,
katazome, tsutsugaki,
fukasa, and tsugigahana).
Since her last lecture
to the guild, she has
continued to accumulate some
wonderful and unusual fabrics from
her contacts in Japan and other sources.

Mary started quilting in 1991 just before she came to live full-time at the Sea Ranch. She was invited to join a minigroup that met on Wednesdays and have continued with that group ever since. This was before the formation of the current guild. A few years after this, the current quilt guild was formed. Mary was active in the startup and has

been continuously involved ever since with stints as Program Chair, then on to teaching (often with Janet Sears) classes in Beginning Quilting, Intermediate Quilting, How to Finish Your Quilt and Sashiko. Mary's interest was piqued by notice of a quilter's tour to Japan which she joined for the first time in 1996. She was hooked on Japan. Not just the textiles,

but the entire culture. She has returned six times, first with the same tour and then, as she learned enough Japanese, on her own.
While in Japan She has taken many courses and attended lectures in indigo dyeing, sashiko and history textiles of Japan. Her interest

has narrowed to an emphasis on Japanese, cotton, indigo-dyed country textiles. In particular she loves the old, worn, soft, often ragged textiles called "boro" which means ragged or torn in Japanese She has become not just a quilter but also a textile collector.

Showings of Mary's quilts have included two at the Sea Ranch Lodge, Art in the Redwoods which have received numerous awards, a special

show at an international quilt show in Yokohama and several at the Pacific Interational Quilt Show. At the debut of the Long Beach International Show in 2008, one of her quilts *Surfing With Dolphins* was included in a special show called Surf's Up.
