## Gift Bags for Children

A hospital can be a scary place for sick children. That's why UCSF Children's Hospital tries to create a welcoming and home-like environment for children who are admitted to the hospital. At the April PPQG meeting, Michael Towne, Manager of Child Life Services at UCSF, asked the members if they would be willing to make fabric drawstring bags which will be given to children when they are admitted to the hospital. The bags will contain toys and play activities as well as information about the hospital. The response to this request has been tremendous. At the May meeting 238 bags were donated. # Instructions for Creating Fabric Drawstring Bags for UCSF

Thank you for being willing to make fabric drawstring bags for the UCSF Children's Hospital. These bags will be used to create gift packages for children who are admitted to the hospital.

**Guide:** From 2 1/4 yards of cotton material (42-45" wide), you could create 12 bags, 4 each of 3 different sizes (14" finished, 11" finished and 8" finished). The material can be any color, but the print should be child appropriate. The smallest bags are for infants; middle size for school-age children; largest size for teens.

Cutting the material: Cut a standard width (42-45") of cotton into 4 pieces along the length of the material. This will give you four strips each of which is 10 1/2" to 11 1/4" wide. For 14" finished bags, cut strips 32" long. For 11" finished bags, cut strips 26" long. For 8" finished bags, cut strips 20" long.

**Sewing:** Fold the strips in half lengthwise with

the right sides together. Create 1/2" seams on both sides. For the 14" finished bags, stop at 3" from the top; leave a 1" gap in the seam, then seam the remaining 12" on each side. Open the seams at the top. Turn the top 2" to the inside; turn 1/4" under and stitch around the bag at the 1 3/4" from the top line (just below the opening). Stitch around the bag again at 3/4" from top. This will leave a 3/4" cuff at the top and a 1" pocket to create the drawstring. Turn the bag right side out.

Creating the drawstring: Cut two pieces of 1/4" ribbon each 25" long. Using a safety pin attached to one end, run a ribbon through the opening on one side of the bag and around the bag until it comes out at the same side. Make sure the ribbon lies flat in the pocket. Remove the safety pin and tie the two ends together. Trim the ends at an angle. Repeat from the other side of the bag with the second ribbon. For 11" finished bags: Cut strips 26" long. Sew seams to 3" from the top, leave a 1" gap; then seam remaining 9" to the bottom and continue top as above. For 8" finished bags: Cut strips 20" long. Sew seams to 3" from the top, leave a 1" gap; then seam remaining 6" to the bottom and continue top as above
