

# Fall Programs Look Exciting

#### Liz Berg—September 15–17

Liz characterizes her work as using bold colors, coupled with line and shape brought to form pleasing compositions, usually abstract pieces open to individual interpretation. She works intuitively



and spontaneously most of the time, although usually with a clear idea of where she wants the piece to go. She emphasizes incorporating multiple levels of depth to bring viewers in closer and closer to see more detail. She

sees her sewing machine as the final embellishment tool, adding lustrous threads and other elements of design. Liz's upcoming workshops can be taken separately or together. Design rather than sewing classes, the first workshop focuses on the elements and principles of design (other than the element of color) using fabric scrap mock-ups. The second all-day workshop will be a fun exploration of color dynamics that will help you give a new "wow" effect to your traditional or art quilts. Expect to leave each of these days with a number of ideas

### President's Message

I hope you have all been enjoying these lazy, hazy, With the 9th anniversary of 9/11 coming up this month, I have been thinking a lot about a quilt show I went to in 2004 in the quaint little town of Panguitch, Utah. It was the 7th Annual Quilt Walk Festival. There were a lot of activities such as a



craft fair, pancake breakfast, etc. but the two main attractions were a quilt show at the high school and the *United In Memory 9–11 Victims Memorial Quilt* on display at the local arena.

The show at the high school was great, something like our challenge show plus booths with fabric but the Memorial Quilt was absolutely so moving, I will never forget it. The arena felt like a sacred place with people speaking in hushed tones. I was surrounded by row after row of 10 1/2 foot square panels, each containing 25 blocks, hung on racks. There were 142 panels, memorializing every victim, including several blocks which are dedicated to rescue dogs. All types of quilting were represented and all levels of skill. Some were done by children, parents or other relatives of victims. These sometimes contained trinkets or pieces of fabric from items belonging to the victims. Others had original poems, still others



photos. I found myself reaching again and again for the tissue boxes conveniently set out on tables. About 3,500 people from 18 countries contributed to this incredible tribute to the people who died on that day. As I said beore it was an experience I will never forget. I hope we will never forget the events of 9/11 either.

At the time I saw it the Memorial Quilt was on tour waiting for a permanent home in Washington, D.C. or New York. The last information I could find was at http://where-to-turn.org/ dated 2009. Where is it now? I would love to know. If any of you have more current information or can find some please let me know. It should be on display somewhere.


