Farewell to Anita Kaplan: One of PPQG's Founders

We have the sad task of bidding farewell to one of our most influential members – Anita Kaplan. Anita and Steve have sold their home and will relocate to Lausanne, Switzerland and ultimately, Portland, Oregon.

Simply put, without Anita, there would have been no Pacific Piecemakers Quilt Guild. In the beginning there was no Guild, just a bunch of informal quilt groups, which met weekly but had no larger purpose. In 1996, after visiting a quilt guild in Florida, Anita conceived the idea of uniting those disparate groups under the umbrella of a north coast guild. She and Gail Stewart met, combined their considerable organizational skills, and formed PPQG. From humble beginnings, it has grown to the sizeable and vibrant entity that it is today.

Anita has always been an integral part of the Guild. She was its first newsletter editor, and the only one for six years. She then became chairman of Programs, and ultimately took on the task of Special Events Coordinator. In that role, she has organized six heavenly retreats for guild members.

Those of you who have seen her quilts can attest to her artistry. Many others have taken notice, as well. Her quilts have hung in over twenty separate venues throughout the country and in Europe. Her awards would require another page to list!

But perhaps her impact has been felt most strongly by those she has mentored. At the last retreat, when each attendee was asked how they came to be quilters, every other person said, "Anita got me into quilting!" She has taught many classes for the Guild, and has always been unstintingly generous in her willingness to offer sewing help and emotional support to those who have hit a wall.

It is impossible to overstate her contributions to this Guild. There will be a big vacuum here when she goes, one it's difficult to imagine ever being filled. Goodbye, Anita, thank you for all you have given, and please remember us as you embark on this new chapter of your life.
