They teach their two most popular purse

designs, the soft gathered "Bohemian and the structured "New Yorker". There are patterns and kits for both purse designs. The New Yorker pattern is \$10 and Bohemian is \$9. Kits for both purses are \$25 and include the following:

New Yorker-Pattern, PbD stabilizer, magnetic snap, purse feet and bottom (purses have feet?) Bohemian-pattern grommets and setting tool, cording for the handle and batting/interfacing. Pam and Roseanne request that participants cut out their fabric and lining including the pocket(s) so that all start together.

Carol and I heard their short presentation last year at NCQC and we knew these ladies would be a hit.

Quilts of Valor Delivery

Making Quilts of Valor has been a passion of mine for the last five years, but never did I experience the true rewards of that passion until this year. I was privileged to go with Marilyn Limbaugh, Polly Dakin, and Jan Carter to the Veterans Hospital in Palo Alto where we delivered this year's crop of quilts to the wounded veterans who are there.

I cannot imagine a more moving, heart-warming, and at the same time, shattering experience. There were veterans of all ages, but the majority were young men – men who have sacrificed their youth and their bodies for their country and the principles for which it stands.

Marilyn, who (with Carol Tackett) has fronted this movement since its inception, was supremely well organized. We took a total of thirty quilts which we arrayed around their all-purpose room. Marilyn gave a brief statement about Quilts of Valor, and about the difference between a quilt and a blanket. She handed out some information about QOV's and about our Guild, including a map which showed just where Gualala is.

The patients were then invited to choose a quilt. Some were ambulatory and could get to them on their own; others were in wheelchairs. Some needed help in choosing; others knew just what they wanted. It became clear that the trauma they had experienced was not just physical, but left many of them with mental and emotional scars, as well. Some were simply incapable of understanding the concept at all.

I was moved to tears when one young man kept thanking me for what we had done. Finally I had to remind him that we owed the thanks to him. Many of the patients were still undergoing medical procedures or therapy. We left the quilts on display with the staff (wonderful, warm, caring) promising to make sure everyone would have a chance to choose. Any leftover quilts will be held for new arrivals.

Ladies, MAKE A QUILT OF VALOR! They bring at least a moment of joy into lives of those who have very little about which to be joyous. This year's thirty quilts was a record; let's break it for next year! ~Jeri Taylor
