May Workshop: A Week With Rosalie Dace

We were very lucky to offer a four-day workshop plus a lecture from world-renowned South African Quilter Rosalie Dace. She was here five years ago and the possibility of her return was met with an overwhelmingly positive reaction. Even the need to change our May schedule to the first week, rather than the third, did not deter our members from signing up for her class. The class filled quickly and there was a waiting list.

Rosalie is well known for her stunning art quilts, her use of color and texture, and her lively, supportive teaching style. Her class was entitled "Quilting from Kandinsky." Even those members who confessed a dislike of Kandinsky's style were drawn into the flow as Rosalie made it clear that this was not a class designed to copy Kandinsky, but to use his influence on the development of abstract art as a jumping off place for each quilter's personal creativity and style.

Each day began with an appropriate, and often profound quotation that Rosalie chose to inspire us. While we all had plenty of time each day to devote to our individual pieces, Rosalie spent time each day discussing such concepts as color, texture, composition, stitching (both hand and machine), expression, and creativity in the designing of our quilts. I think I can speak for everyone in the class when I say that no matter



where each of us is on our quilting journey, Rosalie had a great deal to offer. She gently, but firmly, pushed each of us out of our personal comfort zone.

Her lecture on Friday was well attended, both by guild members and several guests. She took us on a journey through her quilting development, focusing on the African influences on her work. Perhaps the finest compliment she received was the number of people who asked if she could come back in another five years!


